Asked if the President was inclined to visit the US, Panelo acknowledged that the Duterte was known to be averse to taking long-haul flights.

'Ang pagkakaalam natin kay Presidente kasi ayaw niya sa malamig, ayaw niya sa mahahabang biyahe. Hindi siya kumportable doon (What I know of the President, he does not like cold climates, long haul flights. He is not comfortable with that)," he said.

The President has been invited to visit the US but he has yet to accept the invitation. Duterte, annoyed by foreign inference in local affairs, previously said he would nev-

Foreign Affairs Secretary Teodoro Loc-sin Jr. recently said they have conveyed to the President the US invitation. He added that they would have to wait for the end of the May elections before making any arrangements if Duterte agrees to visit the

He made the remarks after US Secre tary of State Michael Pompeo's recent visit to the Manila that included a meeting with President Duterte.

Malacañang recently said the President was optimistic about the prospects of "stronger and more meaningful" ties with the US particularly on defense and security, peace and order, regional stability, as well as the rule of law in the conduct of activities in the West Philippine Sea to prevent

Bong Go: Healthcare still a major issue that should be addressed

DAVAO DEL SUR. - Former Special Assistant to the President (SAP) and aspiring senator Christopher Lawrence "Bong" Go reiterated that healthcare was still a major issue in the Philippines and that measures must be put into place to make quality healthcare more accessible to Filipinos, especially the poor.

"Kailangan pa ring magpasok ng mga pagbabago sa medical services natin. Malaking issue pa rin ang healthcare sa bansa at kailangan itong matugunan (We should introduce chances in our medical services. Health care remains a huge issue in our country that needs to be addressed),"

Go said Saturday.

The former SAP was in his hometown of Davao City where he attended a medical mission held at the Barangay Buhangin Gym in the city's District II.

The medical mission, organized by con-cerned individuals and organizations in cooperation with city government officials doctors from Southern Philippines Medical Center, featured various individu als from different backgrounds assisting in

the service-oriented activity.

Bong Go, who had worked with President Rodrigo Duterte back when Duterte

was still mayor of Davao City, discussed why healthcare has always been a top priority of his.

"Matagal po akong nagserbisyo kay Boss (President Duterte). Sa haba ng panahon na nagtrabaho po ako sa kanya, nakita ko na ito talaga 'yung isa sa pinaka-kailangang ayusing isvu sa Pilipinas (I've worked for President Duterte for so long. In that long stretch of time when I worked for him, I really saw why this is really the most important thing that should be fixed in the Philippines)," Go stated.

Go cited the the Malasakit Center program, foremost among the programs for improving the healthcare services

Fr. Mark Ventura was killed in Gattaran, Cagayan on April 29 only four months after Fr. Marcelito Paez was killed in Nueva Ecija.
In June, Fr. Richmond Nilo

was also killed by unknown gunmen in Cabanatuan.

On the same month, Fr. Rev Urmeneta of the St. Michael the Archangel Parish in Calamba. Laguna, was wounded after being shot by unidentified suspects.

AN ACT MANDATING THE PHILIPPINE OVERSEAS EMPLOYMENT ADMINISTRATION (POEA) TO DEVELOP, PUBLISH, DISSEMINATE AND UPDATE A HANDBOOK ON THE RIGHTS AND RESPONSIBILITIES OF MIGRANT WORKERS, AMENDING FOR THE PURPOSE REPUBLIC ACT NO. 8042. OTHERWISE KNOWN AS THE "MIGRANT WORKERS AND OVERSEAS FILIPINOS ACT OF 1995". AS AMENDED BY REPUBLIC ACT

SECTION 1. Title. – This Act shall be known as the dbook for OFWs Act of 2018".

SEC. 2. Creating a Handbook for Overseas Filipino Workers. — The handbook for overseas Filipino workers, known in this Act as "Handbook" shall be created and issued to every land-based and seabased worker free of charge. It shall serve as a ready reference for migrant workers when they need to assert their rights and responsibilities. It shall also deal with key issues that they need to know in order to maintain decent employment conditions overseas.

The contents of the Handbook shall be written in English with translations in local languages as may be necessary.

SEC. 3. Objectives of the Handbook. – The objectives of creating a Handbook are as follows:

(a) To empower every overseas Filipino worker (OFW) by making them fully aware of their rights and responsibilities;

(b) To complement the worker education program of various agencies;

(c) To provide a basic information on the labor and living litions in the country of their destination;

(d) To make the workers well aware of the benefits and backs of working overseas; and

(e) To provide necessary information for their reintegration into the Philippine society.

SEC. 4. Amendment. – Subparagraph (b.1) of paragraph (b) of Section 23 of Republic Act No. 8042, as amended, is hereby further amended to read as follows:

"SEC. 23. Role of Government Agencies. – The following government agencies shall perform the following to promote the welfare and protect the rights of migrant workers and, as far as applicable, all overseas Filipinos.

"(a) Department of Foreign Affairs - x x x

"(b) Department of Labor and Employment – The Department of Labor and Employment shall see to it that labor and social welfare laws in the foreign countries are fairly applied to migrant workers and whenever applicable, to other overseas Filipinos including the grant of legal assistance and the referral to proper medical centers or hospitals;

"In addition to its powers and functions, the Administration shall inform migrant workers not only of their rights as workers but also of their rights as human beings, instruct and guide the workers how to assert their rights and provide the available mechanism to redress violation of their rights.

"The Administration is hereby mandated to develop, publish, disseminate and update periodically a Handbook on the rights and responsibilities of migrant workers as provided by Philippine laws and the existing labor and social laws of the countries of destination that will protect and guarantee the rights of migrant workers. The Handbook shall be written in simple words that can be easily understood with translation in local language as may

"It shall also be responsible for the implementation, in partnership with other law enforcement agencies, of an intensified program against illegal recruitment activities. For this purpose, the POEA shall provide comprehensive gender-sensitive Pre-employment Orientation Seminars (PEOS) that will discuss topics not only on the prevention of illegal recruitment but also on the content of the Handbook on the rights and responsibilities of migrant workers.

SEC. 5. Implementing Agencies. — The Philippine Overseas Employment Administration (POEA), in coordination with the Department of Labor and Employment (DOLE) and the Overseas Workers Welfare Administration (OWWA), Department of Foreign Affairs (DFA), Inter-Agency Council Against Trafficking (IACAT), Commission on Filipinos Overseas (CFO) and Maritime Industry Authority (MARINA), is mandated to implement this Act.


SEC. 6. Appropriations. — The amount necessary for the continuous publication, distribution and update of the Handbook shall be taken from the appropriations of the POEA. Thereafter, the amount necessary to carry out the provisions of this Act shall be provided for in the General Appropriations. Act of the year following its enactment into law and thereafter

SEC. 7. Repealing Clause. — All laws, rules or regulations are inconsistent with the provisions of this Act are hereby aled or amended accordingly.

SEC. 8. Separability Clause. — If any provision of this is held unconstitutional or invalid, such holding shall not other provisions not affected thereby.

SEC. 9. Effectivity. – This Act shall take effect fifteen days after its publication in the Official Gazette and in ast one (1) newspaper of general circulation.

Gordon, chairman of the Senate Blue Ribbon Commit-tee, which probed the controversy of the government's ₱3.5-billion dengue immunization billion dengue immunization program, on Sunday aired his belief that the case of reckless imprudence resulting in homi-cide against Garin and her fel-low respondents will not stand up in court, and may be dis-missed for lack of evidence.

In an interview over radio DZBB, Gordon maintained that there has been no scientific study yet proving that the Sanofi Pas-teur-manufactured Dengvaxia caused the deaths of children who

received shots of the vaccine.
"Hindi pa naman talaga nasasabi na Sanofi ang principal the vaccine. We really have no evidence yet)," the senator, who is also a lawyer, said. He recalled this was also found in the blue ribbon com-mittee's inquiry
