RESOLUTION HONORING THE LATE CARMEN GUERRERO-NAKPIL FOR HER EXEMPLARY AND TOWERING ROLE AND CONTRIBUTIONS TO THE SHAPING AND ENRICHMENT OF HISTORY WRITING AND LITERATURE IN THE PHILIPPINES

WHEREAS, the Senate of the Philippines has, in myriad occasions, commended and honored iconic Filipinos for their triumphs and excellencies in their respective fields, which have greatly influenced the country's development throughout the years;

WHEREAS, Article II, Section 17 of the 1987 Constitution emphasizes the importance of arts in fostering patriotism and nationalism, upholding human progress, liberation and development;

WHEREAS, on 30 of July 2018, Carmen Guerrero-Nakpil, considered to be the Grand Dame of Philippine letters and Grand Old Lady of Public History, succumbed at the age of 961;

WHEREAS, Guerrero-Nakpil was born to the distinguished Guerrero family in Ermita, Manila on 19 July 1922. The legendary Guerrero family is known for their cultural, scientific and historical legacies²;

WHEREAS, Guerrero-Nakpil finished her Bachelor of Arts Degree in St. Therese College (1942), the same place where she first started her journalism career as an editor for the college's campus paper, *The Orion*. She later on became an editor and columnist for various publications, some of which were the Manila Chronicle

where she wrote under the column "My Humble Opinion" for 12 years, the Sunday Times Magazine, Weekly Women's Magazine and Malaya³;

WHEREAS, as a journalist, memoirist and historian, her works not only reflected her personal experiences, but they also mirrored the rich history of Manila and what it was like to be a Filipino during the 20th and 21st centuries, specifically during the post-war period;

WHEREAS, her unparalleled contributions and impact in Philippine Literature have earned for her the Gawad Pambansang Alagad ni Balagtas (National Disciple of Balagtas Prize), Lifetime Achievement from the Unyon ng mga Manunulat ng Pilipinas (Umpil) in 1988, and SEA (Southern Asian) Write Award in 1990⁴;

WHEREAS, aside from her journalistic prowess, Guerrero-Nakpil also held important leadership positions in government, including her being the Chairperson of the National Historical Commission of the Philippines (1967-1971), by productively steering the preservation and promotion of historical places in the country⁵;

WHEREAS, Guerrero-Nakpil also chaired the cultural committee of the Philippine Commission for the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Education (UNESCO), and likewise became a member of the UNESCO General Assembly, Commission on the Role of Women, the Philippine Board of Review for Motion Pictures. She also became the Director General of the Technology Resource Center⁶;

WHEREAS, among Guerrero-Nakpil's most remarkable works were Woman Enough and Other Essays (1963), The Philippines and the Filipinos (1977), The Philippines (1989) and Rice Conspiracy (1990)⁷. She was also known for a trilogy based on her life comprising Myself, Elsewhere (2006), Legends and Adventures (2007) and Exeunt (2009)⁸;

She is and will always be an exemplary and towering figure, who has helped in shaping and nurturing the fields of Philippine literature and history writing.
