## AN ACT PROVIDING BENEFITS TO BARANGAY VOLUNTEER WORKERS

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Philippines in Congress assembled:

- SECTION 1. *Title*. This Act shall be known as the "Barangay Volunteer Workers' Benefits Act".
- SEC. 2. Declaration of Policy. It is hereby declared the policy of the State to enhance and promote the social and economic status of barangay volunteers. The State shall protect the rights of barangay volunteers and promote their welfare.
- SEC. 3. Coverage. This Act shall cover all members of accredited civilian volunteer organizations (CVOs) and all other volunteers who perform regular governance or service functions in the barangay.
- SEC. 4. Definition of Terms. For purposes of this Act, the following shall mean:
- 12 (a) Civilian volunteer organization (CVO) shall refer to a body or 13 brigade composed of barangay volunteers such as, but not limited to, barangay 14 health workers, barangay nutrition scholars, barangay tanod, members of the

- lupong tagapamayapa, and members of community brigade and community service units duly created at the barangay level to assist the barangay officials in the effective exercise of law enforcement for the maintenance of peace and order and the promotion of public safety, security, health, social welfare and the spirit of volunteerism in the barangay.
- (b) Barangay volunteer workers shall refer to individuals who belong to an accredited CVO committed to rendering their services and resources, whether full-time or part-time, to promote the public good.
- (c) Volunteerism shall refer to an act involving traditional forms of mutual aid and developmental interventions that provides an enabling and empowering environment, both on the part of the beneficiary receiving and the volunteer rendering the act, undertaken for reasons arising from socio-developmental commitment or conviction for the attainment of public good and where monetary and other incentives are not the primary motivating factors.
- SEC. 5. Qualifications. A barangay volunteer must be of legal age, must be a resident of the barangay where one intends to volunteer and must be of good moral character. A barangay volunteer may continue to serve the community for as long as one wishes to, and able to maintain these qualifications, and if such performance as a volunteer is considered commendable by barangay officials.
- SEC. 6. Duties and Obligations of a Barangay Volunteer. The barangay volunteer worker shall:
- (a) Make available time, knowledge and skills to the barangay and report for work as agreed with barangay officials;
- (b) Maintain and promote peace, public safety, security, health, social welfare and the spirit of volunteerism in the barangay;

(c) Discharge duty humanely with conscience and dignity, and with utmost respect for life, gender and religion; and

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- (d) Submit a written resignation when one wishes to resign at least fifteen (15) days prior to effectivity thereof.
- SEC. 7. Statutory Fund Allocation for the Allowance of Barangay Volunteers. The barangay shall provide allowances to barangay volunteers, which may not exceed the minimum salary rate for Salary Grade 1: Provided, That no volunteer shall receive an allowance lower than One thousand five hundred pesos (P1,500.00) per month.

Said allowances shall be charged to the administrative budget of the barangay, which comprise eighty percent (80%) of its annual internal revenue allotment, and income from other sources: *Provided, further*, That these shall not be covered by the fifty-five percent (55%) cap on Personal Services: *Provided, finally*, That the payment of said allowances shall be subject to the availability of funds and pertinent budgeting, accounting and auditing rules and regulations.

- SEC. 8. Security of Term. A barangay volunteer shall be asked to sign a memorandum of agreement (MOA) defining the period of service, reckoned from the date of the volunteer's assignment. This MOA may be renewed upon the agreement of the volunteer, the CVO and the barangay chairperson.
- SEC. 9. Additional Benefits. In recognition of their services, barangay volunteers shall be provided the following benefits and incentives:
- (a) PhilHealth coverage which shall include medical examination and treatment in government hospitals and fully subsidized by the local government units (LGUs) or through cost-sharing mechanisms between LGUs and other sponsors: *Provided*, That indigent barangay volunteers shall be covered through full national government subsidy scheme;

- (b) Free legal services from government lawyers or private lawyers pursuant to Republic Act No. 9999 and Bar Matter No. 2012 for cases arising from acts committed in the performance of duty: *Provided,* That such legal services shall continue, even after the expiration of the term of the barangay volunteer, until its final disposition; and
- (c) Trainings and seminars on human rights, disaster response and risk reduction and others, deemed necessary by the city or municipality where the barangay volunteers render service.
- SEC. 10. Review by the Sangguniang Barangay. Every incentive or benefit for barangay volunteers requiring expenditure of local funds shall be reviewed and approved by the sangguniang barangay.
- SEC. 11. Implementing Rules and Regulations. The Department of the Interior and Local Government (DILG) National Barangay Operations Office (NBOO), in consultation with the National Liga ng mga Barangay and CVOs, shall issue the rules and regulations to implement this Act within ninety (90) days after its approval.
- SEC. 12. Separability Clause. If any provision of this Act is declared unconstitutional, the same shall not affect the validity and effectivity of the other provisions hereof.
- SEC. 13. Repealing Clause. All laws, decrees, orders and issuances or portion thereof, as well as rules and regulations inconsistent with the provisions of this Act are hereby repealed or modified accordingly.
- SEC. 14. Effectivity. This Act shall take effect fifteen (15) days after its publication in the Official Gazette or in any newspaper of general circulation.
