- EDUCATION ESTABLISHING TECHNICAL AN ACT AND SKILLS DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY (TESDA) ASSESSMENT CENTERS IN AND TRAINING ALABAT, GUMACA. MUNICIPALITIES OF THE TAGKAWAYAN, AND GUINAYANGAN IN THE APPROPRIATING PROVINCE OF QUEZON, AND FUNDS THEREFOR

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Philippines in Congress assembled:

SECTION 1. Short Title. - This Act shall be known as the
 "Alabat, Gumaca, Tagkawayan, and Guinayangan, Quezon Province
 TESDA Training and Assessment Centers Act".

SEC. 2. Establishment. - There are hereby established 4 Technical Education and Skills Development Authority (TESDA) 5 Training and Assessment Centers in the island municipalities of 6 Alabat, Gumaca, Tagkawayan, and Guinayangan in the Province of 7 Quezon, under the supervision of the TESDA, to be known 8 individually as follows: (a) Alabat, Quezon Training and Assessment 9 Center; (b) Gumaca, Quezon Training and Assessment Center; 10 (c) Tagkawayan, Quezon Training and Assessment Center; and 11 (d) Guinayangan, Quezon Training and Assessment Center. 12

The SEC. 3. General Mandate. _ Alabat. Gumaca. 1 Tagkawayan, and Guinayangan, Quezon Province TESDA Training 2 and Assessment Centers, hereinafter referred to as the Centers, 3 shall respectively and primarily provide technical-vocational 4 training and skills development programs to students and residents 5 from low-income families and out-of-school youths, including college 6 dropouts and persons with disabilities, in the island municipalities 7 of Alabat, Gumaca, Tagkawayan, and Guinayangan, and the other 8 adjacent localities in the Province of Quezon, geared towards the 9 acquisition of practical livelihood, employable skills, gainful 10 employment, and entrepreneurship. 11

12 The Centers shall help train local residents to become 13 productive, self-reliant and globally competitive middle to high-level 14 skilled labor force to hasten the social and economic development of 15 these areas, in particular, and to meet the manpower needs of both 16 local and international labor markets, in general.

The Centers shall consider in the design of relevant 17 technical-vocational training programs to be offered thereat a 18 competency assessment of the socioeconomic profile, employment 19 conditions and opportunities, business climate, market and industry 20 potentials, available resources, presence of support structures, 21 including the literacy level and skills readiness, and the overall 22 development within the host areas and adjacent communities 23 within the operational radius of the Centers established herein. 24 The Centers shall also consider the relevant skills trade 25 programs, and craftsmanship training 26 competencies. entrepreneurship activities needed to deliver the effective 27

employment and development interventions required to make these
 areas as human resource and productivity hubs.

The Centers shall also serve as TESDA-accredited assessment 3 centers for acquired competencies in technical-vocational skills. 4 Preference in admission shall be given to the most disadvantaged 5 6 citizens, including persons with disabilities, and to the most economically depressed areas of the municipalities of Alabat, 7 Gumaca, Tagkawayan, and Guinayangan, and the other adjacent 8 localities in the Province of Quezon with the highest percentage of 9 disadvantaged and indigent citizens. 10

11 The Centers shall, in coordination with the Department of 12 Education (DepEd) and the TESDA, offer relevant teachers' training 13 assistance and curriculum design to the secondary schools providing 14 the technical-vocational livelihood (TVL) track under the K to 12 15 Program of the DepEd.

SEC. 4. Training Programs. - The Centers shall offer 16 17 diverse short-term certificate courses and modular trainings in relevant technical-vocational skills and trade specialization to 18 19 comply with employment standards in preferred and emerging market-driven labor opportunities, and shall likewise give premium 20 efforts to skills specialization for local market employment 21 22 requirements geared towards achieving the development of a robust 23 inclusive economy within the host areas and each of the adjacent localities and communities within the operational radius of the 24 25 Centers, in consultation with the Department of Labor and Employment (DOLE), the Department of Trade and Industry (DTI), 26 27 the Department of Science and Technology (DOST), the Department

of the Interior and Local Government (DILG), the National
 Economic and Development Authority (NEDA), business-industry
 partners, and such other relevant agencies, both local and
 international.

5 The Centers may establish research and technology hubs, 6 technology development farms, mobile training programs, and 7 satellite or extension training centers in priority areas throughout 8 the Province of Quezon within the service radius of the Centers to 9 strengthen linkages among the industry, the academe and the 10 Centers.

To address the development and manpower needs of the 11 municipalities of Alabat, Gumaca, Tagkawayan, and Guinayangan, 12 13 and the other adjacent localities in the Province of Quezon, the Centers shall offer the following TESDA-registered 14 15 technical-vocational training programs with competencies 16 assessment leading to National Certification Levels I-III:

(a) Skills training in industrial technology and hard trade
such as metal and steel works, machine fabrication and operation,
heavy equipment operation, automotive mechanic, refrigeration and
air conditioning, electronics, and operation of power tools and
equipment for both medium skills grade and industrial purposes;

(b) Agriculture and aquaculture-related training and skills development in such areas as farming-fishing operations technology, backyard farming and home-based aquaculture and propagation innovation, mechanized farm and fishing tools and equipment operation, agribusiness, agri-aqua trade technology and

innovations, and relevant farmers and fisherfolks' continuing
 training for increased productivity and entrepreneurship;

3 (c) Social communication skills development, language 4 proficiency courses in English and other languages for business 5 process outsourcing employment such as call center and overseas 6 job placement;

7 (d) Livelihood skills development courses for preferred skills 8 employment and small-scale entrepreneurship, including practical 9 skills education in crafts and arts, workmanship and designing, 10 high-speed sewing, dressmaking and tailoring, horticulture, 11 livestock raising and breeding, food processing technology, home 12 technology, culinary arts and commercial cooking, cosmetology, 13 health and wellness training;

14 (e) Basic business literacy training in financial management and marketing, practical accountancy, bookkeeping and office 15 16 procedures, business processes and application procedures including 17 registration, licensing, documentation, business patent and 18 intellectual property regulation, business financing and investment opportunities sourcing, import-export accreditation, 19 online home-based business operation and social media business 20 21 marketing:

(f) Technical-vocational occupation and trade skills such as
carpentry, masonry, plumbing, welding, practical electricity and
installation, automotive servicing, electronics servicing, basic
personal computer (PC) troubleshooting and servicing, and such
other relevant practical skills courses;

literacy and information 1 (g) Computer technology (IT)-related skills, digital technology, web design, animation, 2 3 photoshop/online photography, computer design and advertising;

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(h) Seminars in personality development, career counseling and job placement, and work ethic and values; and 5

Other preferred priority skills and trade training that 6 (i) 7 may be utilized by the people of the municipalities of Alabat, 8 Gumaca, Tagkawayan, and Guinayangan, and the other localities in the Province of Quezon, to enhance their capacities for practical 9 livelihood, gainful employment, and entrepreneurial activities. 10

SEC. 5. Compliance with TESDA Requirements. 11 The provisions of this Act notwithstanding, the Alabat, Gumaca, 12 Tagkawayan, and Guinayangan Centers established herein shall 13 become operationally effective only upon the determination and 14 15 declaration of the TESDA, through the issuance of a formal recommendation and certificate of compliance, that the four (4) 16 Centers have individually and satisfactorily complied with the 17 minimum requirements for quality standards prescribed by the 18 19 TESDA governing the following competency assessment: 20 (a) standard procedures and guidelines (SPGs) for the 21 establishment and operation of a TESDA-accredited training and 22 assessment center; (b) operational sustainability of the Centers established herein, such as licensed faculty-trainers and personnel, 23 equipment, training and laboratory facilities, and instructional 24 materials; (c) sustainable funding source and allocation for the 25 budgetary requirement of the Centers herein established; 26 (d) assurance that the training programs offered are fully aligned 27

with the minimum standards of competency-based quality technical-vocational skills technology and the needs of the host sites and adjacent localities served in the context of the Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN) and Philippine Qualifications Framework (PQF) for technical-vocational education; and (e) compliance with such other TESDA conditionalities and standards, as may be necessary and applicable.

8 SEC. 6. Administration. - The Centers shall each be headed 9 by a Technical-Vocational Administrator, under the supervision of 10 the TESDA, who shall render full-time services and be responsible 11 for the administration and operation of each of the Centers.

12 The Technical-Vocational Administrator of each of the Centers 13 shall be appointed by the TESDA Director General in accordance 14 with Civil Service Commission rules and regulations and the 15 qualification requirements for such office.

16 The Technical-Vocational Administrator of each of the Centers 17 shall enter into mutual agreements with locally-based private and 18 public counterpart agencies or instrumentalities and persons, 19 subject to approval of the TESDA Director General, for such 20 assistance as may be necessary to effectively implement this Act.

21 SEC. 7. Appropriations. – The Director General of the 22 TESDA shall include in the Authority's program the 23 implementation of this Act, the funding of which shall be included 24 in the annual General Appropriations Act. The LGUs concerned, 25 in consultation with the TESDA, shall likewise set aside from 26 any available local revenue an amount deemed appropriate as

1 annual counterpart fund to support the operation of the Centers 2 established herein.

3 SEC. 8. Implementing Rules and Regulations. - Within 4 ninety (90) days after the approval of this Act, the TESDA, in 5 coordination with the DOLE, the DTI, the DOST, the NEDA, the 6 Department of Budget and Management (DBM), the DILG, 7 the concerned LGUs, and such other relevant agencies and 8 industry-business partners of the host localities shall prepare and 9 issue the necessary rules and regulations for the implementation of this Act. 10

11 SEC. 9. Separability Clause. - If, for any reason, any section 12 or provision of this Act shall be deemed unconstitutional or invalid. 13 the other sections or provisions hereof shall not be affected and 14 shall remain in force and effect.

SEC. 10. Repealing Clause. - All laws, executive orders, 15 decrees, instructions, rules and regulations contrary to or 16 inconsistent with any provision of this Act are hereby repealed or 17 18 amended accordingly.

19 SEC. 11. Effectivity. – This Act shall take effect fifteen (15) days after its publication in the Official Gazette or in a newspaper of 20 21 general circulation.
