

**AN ACT
ESTABLISHING THE MAGNA CARTA FOR BARANGAYS**

EXPLANATORY NOTE

The development of the country lies with the development of its people. No government policy or program, no matter how well-crafted can be called a success unless it would be able to reach each and every one of its constituents, up to the last individual in the barangay.


The barangay is the basic unit of government, the closest to its constituents and the first line of government service people turn to. The Local Government Code of 1991 recognizes the important role of the barangay as it states that: "As the basic political unit, the barangay serves as the primary planning and implementing unit of government policies, plans, programs, projects and activities in the community, as a forum wherein the collective views of people may be expressed, crystalized, and considered and where disputes may be amicably settled."

Empowering the barangay is the key to ensuring that government policies being pursued for the development and progress of the country are properly implemented. It is through the barangay that development programs can be delivered and effectively reach each and every Filipino, even those in the most remote areas of the country.

This bill seeks to strengthen the barangay by providing for the Magna Carta for Barangays. As frontliners in the delivery of services, barangays shall enjoy local autonomy through the automatic release of their funds from the national government. They shall likewise receive their mandatory share in the taxes, fees and charges collected within their respective areas of jurisdiction, and financial support for the maintenance of roads and bridges within their area.

This bill also gives due recognition to barangay officials as regular employees of government with fixed salaries, allowances, insurance, medical and dental coverage, retirement benefits and such other fringe benefits for which regular employees may be entitled to, instead of just receiving honoraria.


In view of the foregoing, the passage of this bill is earnestly sought.

**AN ACT
ESTABLISHING THE MAGNA CARTA FOR BARANGAYS**

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Philippines in Congress assembled:

**TITLE I
DECLARATION OF POLICY, AND GENERAL PRINCIPLES**

Section 1. *Short Title.* - This Act shall be known as the "Magna Carta for Barangays."

Sec. 2. *Declaration of Policy.* - It is the policy of the State to promote, develop and improve the general welfare of barangay residents, raise the economic and social status of barangay officials, grant every barangay, the basic facilities for decent, healthy and comfortable living therein and provide new measures that will ensure its enjoyment of local autonomy to ensure the effective performance of its role as the primary planning and implementing unit of government programs, projects and activities, and as a forum in which the collective views of the people in the community may be crystallized and considered.

Sec. 3. *General Principles.* - The following are the general principles of this Act:

- a. The national government shall give more attention to the development of the barangay, as it is the base of this country's economy.
- b. Every barangay shall be given the authority and capability to solve its problems on its level.
- c. Self-help or people power shall be the guiding principle in all barangay development projects.

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TITLE II
BARANGAY OFFICIALS AS REGULAR GOVERNMENT EMPLOYEES

Sec. 4. *The Barangay Officials as Regular Government Employees.* - The punong barangay, sangguniang barangay members, the kabataang barangay chairman, the barangay secretary and barangay treasurer in all barangays are hereby declared regular employees, and as such, are entitled to fixed salaries, allowances, insurance, medical and dental coverage, retirement benefits and such other fringe benefits to which a regular government employee may be entitled to.

Sec. 5. *Salaries of Barangay Officials.* - As soon as the appropriate steps and measures are undertaken by each city or municipality in coordination with the individual barangay involved on matters relating to the sources of fund and the corresponding appropriation ordinance, which in no case shall be later than six (6) months from the approval hereof, all barangay officials mentioned in paragraph 4 hereof shall be entitled to the following fixed salaries:

- a. Punong Barangay - An amount equivalent to the salary of a sangguniang bayan member of his municipality;
- b. Six Sangguniang Barangay Members - An amount equivalent to eighty percent (80%) of the salary of a sangguniang bayan member of his municipality;
- c. Kabataang Barangay Chairman, Barangay Secretary, Barangay Treasurer - For each, an amount equivalent to seventy-five percent (75%) of the salary of a sangguniang bayan member of his municipality.

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TITLE III
BASIC PRIORITIES IN THE BARANGAY

Sec. 6. *Drinking Water for Every Barangay.* - It is the right of every barangay to have a regular supply of clean and potable drinking water. To attain this goal, every city and municipality, as the case may be, is hereby required to construct and/or maintain at least one deep well with pumping device for drawing drinking water to supply the needs of every one thousand residents for each barangay within its jurisdiction.

Sec. 7. *Transportation for Every Barangay.* - It is also the right of every barangay to have public transportation available at least once a day. For this purpose, every municipality or city, as the case may be, should make such necessary representations before the appropriate government agencies to require public utility companies operating within its jurisdiction to provide the minimum means of transportation in every barangay.

1 **Sec. 8. Schools, Health Centers and Barangay Halls for the Barangays. -**

2 Every barangay is entitled to have at least one elementary school: *Provided*, That there
3 shall be at least one high school for every five (5) kilometers from the barangay center.
4 It shall also be the right of every barangay to have one health center and one barangay
5 hall.

8 **MEASURES TO ASSURE THE ENJOYMENT OF LOCAL AUTONOMY**

10 **Sec. 9. Automatic Release of Share from National Taxes. -**

11 It shall be the duty of the National Treasury to remit automatically to the barangays every end of the
12 calendar year their just share from the national taxes.

13 **Sec. 10. Transfer of Fund to Barangay for the Maintenance of Roads and**

14 **Bridges. -** All public funds appropriated from the national treasury for the maintenance
15 of barangay roads and bridges and other similar constructions shall be transferred or
16 remitted directly to the general fund of every barangay for the proper disposition by the
17 barangay officials.

18 **Sec. 11. Mandatory Share of Barangays in All Taxes, Fees or Other**

19 **Charges. -** Twenty-five percent (25%) of all taxes collected on real property located
20 within the barangay shall be considered barangay funds and shall be allocated in
21 accordance with existing laws. In addition thereto, each barangay shall be entitled to ten
22 percent (10%) from all other forms of taxes, fees, penalties, compromises or other
23 charges collected from persons residing in the barangay or entities whose offices and/or
24 manufacturing plant is located within the barangay.

25 **Sec. 12. Equitable Share of the Barangay from the Proceeds of the**

26 **Utilization and Development of National Wealth. -** Every barangay shall be entitled
27 to an equitable share of the proceeds derived from the exploitation, development and
28 utilization of natural wealth within its territory. The amount of barangay share shall be
29 determined by the city or municipality concerned after consultations with the
30 concessionaires, the municipal or city officials and barangay officials, taking into account
31 the extent of the exposure of the barangay residents to pollution, food and ecological
32 imbalance: *Provided*, however. That this equitable sharing rate for each barangay shall
33 be resolved by all parties concerned not later than six (6) months from the approval of
34 this Act. Revenues derived from this source shall also from part of the general fund of
35 the barangay.

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**TITLE V
SUNDRY MATTERS**

4 **Sec. 13. *Scholarship Grant.*** - Every barangay shall sponsor at least one
5 scholarship grant every year leading to any bachelor degree to be awarded by a
6 committee of five persons appointed by the Sangguniang Barangay with the approval of
7 the Punong Barangay after competitive examinations are given to applicants who should
8 be bona fide residents of the barangay. The grant shall include tuition fees and all other
9 school fees, reasonable allowances for schoolbooks, supplies and transportation and
10 other expenses as the barangay may deem appropriate.

11 **Sec. 14. *Priority in Employment.*** - Residents in every barangay shall have the
12 priority in the hiring of workers and laborers to be needed in any government construction
13 or development projects within the barangay.

14 **Sec. 15. *Cooperative Enterprise.*** - Cooperative enterprises in the barangay
15 shall be encouraged and every barangay is directed to give full assistance for the
16 establishment and organization of said enterprises and to take every possible effort to
17 make cooperative undertakings a way of life in the barangay.

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**TITLE VI
ADMINISTRATION AND ENFORCEMENT**

22 **Sec. 16. *Rules and Regulations.*** - The Secretary of Department of Interior and
23 Local Government shall promulgate such rules and regulations as may be necessary to
24 implement the provisions of this Act. Rules and regulations issued pursuant to this Section
25 shall take effect thirty (30) days after publication in a national newspaper of general
26 circulation and by such other means as the Secretary of Local Government deems
27 reasonably sufficient to give interested parties general notice of such issuance.

28 **Sec. 17. *Budgetary Estimates.*** - The Secretary of Department of Interior and
29 Local Government shall submit to the Congress the necessary budgetary estimates to
30 implement the provisions of this Act concerning the allowances, insurance, medical,
31 dental and retirement benefits and other fringe benefits of barangay officials, the basic
32 priorities in the barangays and the barangay scholarship grant.

33 **Sec. 18. *Penal Provision.*** - Any person who shall willfully interfere with, restrain
34 or coerce any barangay official or barangay resident in the exercise of his or her rights
35 guaranteed by this Act or who shall in any other manner commit any act to defeat any of
36 the provisions of this Act shall, upon conviction, be punished by a fine of not less than
37 Five Hundred Pesos (P500.00) nor more than Two Thousand Pesos (P2,000.00), or by
38 imprisonment of six months and one day, or both, subject to the discretion of the court.

1 If the offender is a public official, the court shall order his dismissal from the government
2 service.

3 **Sec. 19. *Separability Clause.*** - If any provision of this Act is declared
4 unconstitutional, the same shall not affect the validity of the other provisions of this Act.

5 **SEC. 20. *Repealing Clause.*** - All laws, decrees, orders, rules, and regulations or
6 other issuances or parts inconsistent with the provisions of this Act are hereby repealed
7 or modified accordingly.

8 **SEC. 21. *Effectivity.*** - This Act shall take effect fifteen (15) days after its
9 publication in the Official Gazette or in any two (2) newspapers of general circulation in
10 the Philippines.
