Introduced by Congressmen Enverga, Ladrido, Gustilo, Tan, Mitra, Laurel IV, Trono, Reyes, Legaspi, Encinas, Cuenco, Yancha, Agudo, Congresswoman Ziga, Congressmen Dugenio, and Ubay.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

During the last session of Congress, the bill entitled "The Medical Act of 1957" was passed, but unfortunately the President of the Philippines vetoed it in view of some objectionable features thereof.

In the preparation of the present bill, necessary changes were made to remove the objectionable features of the previous bill and at the same time improve or remove the obsolete provisions of the old medical law in the Revised Administrative Code.

There is no question that the present proposed Medical Law will ultimately raise the standards of medical education and of the medical profession in the Philippines and give more power to the Board of Medical Examiners to punish not only the unethical medical practitioners but also the illegal practitioners, quacks and charlatans.

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THE MEDICAL ACT OF 1959

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Philippines in Congress assembled?

ARTICLE I.—Objectives and Implementation 1 SECTION 1. Objectives.—This Act provides for and shall 2 govern (a) the standardization and regulation of medical 3 education; (b) the examination for registration of phy-4 sicians; and (c) the supervision, control and regulation 5 of the practice of medicine in the Philippines. 6 SEC. 2. Enforcement.—For the purpose of implementing 7 the provisions of this Act, there are created the following 8 agencies: the Board of Medical Education under the 9

Department of Education, and the Board of Medical Exam-

11 iners under the Commissioner of Civil Service.

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1	ARTICLE II.—The Board of Medical Education—Its
2	Functions
3	SEC. 3. Composition of Board of Medical Education
4	The Board of Medical Education shall be composed of the
5	Secretary of Health or his duly authorized representative,
6	as Chairman, and the Secretary of Education or his duly
7.	authorized representative, the Director of the Bureau of
8	Private Schools or his duly authorized representative, the
9	Chairman of the Board of Medical Examiners or his duly
10	authorized representative, and a representative from the
11	Philippine Medical Association, as members.
12	The officials acting as Chairman and members of the
13	Board of Medical Education shall hold office during their
14	incumbency in their respective positions.
15	SEC. 4. Compensation and traveling expenses.—The
16	Chairman and members of the Board of Medical Education
17	shall not be entitled to any compensation nor traveling
18	expenses.
19	For administrative purposes, the Board shall hold office
20	in the office of its Chairman, who may designate a ranking
21	official in the Department of Health to serve as secretary
22	of the Board.
23	SEC. 5. Functions.—The functions of the Board of Med-
24	ical Education shall be:

- 1 (a) To determine and prescribe minimum requirements
- 2 for admission into a recognized college of medicine;
- 3 (b) To determine and prescribe requirements for mini-
- 4 mum physical facilities of colleges of medicine, to wit:
- 5 buildings, including hospitals, equipment and supplies,
- -6 apparatus, instruments, appliances, laboratories, bed capac-
 - 7 ity for instruction purposes, operating and delivery rooms,
 - 8 facilities for out-patient services, and others, used for
 - 9 didactic and practical instructions in accordance with mod-
- 10 ern trends;
- 11 (c) To determine and prescribe the minimum number
- 12 and the minimum qualifications of teaching personnel,
- 13 including student-teacher ratio and curriculum;
- 14 (d) To select, determine and approve hospitals or some
- 15 departments of the hospitals for training which comply
- 16 with the minimum specific physical facilities as provided
- 17 in subparagraph (b) hereof; and
- 18 (e) To promulgate and prescribe and enforce necessary
- 19 rules and regulations for the proper implementation of
- 20 the foregoing functions.
- 21 SEC. 6. Minimum, required courses.—Students seeking
- 22 admission to the medical course must have a bachelor of
- 23 science or bachelor of arts degree or their equivalent and
- 24 must have taken in four years the following subjects with
- 25 their corresponding number of units:

17	Eighteen hundred and eighty-one as cultural, social and
18	nationalistic studies.
19,	Provided, That the following students may be permitted
20	to complete the aforesaid preparatory medical course in
21	shorter periods as follows:
22	(a) Students whose general average is below eighty-
23 -	five per cent but without any grade of failure or condition

1	may be allowed to pursue and finish the course in three
2	academic years and the intervening summer sessions; and
3	(b) Students whose general average is eighty-five per
4	cent or over may be permitted to finish the course in three
5	academic years by allowing them to take each semester
6	the overload permitted to bright students under existing
7	regulations of the Bureau of Private Schools.
8	Provided, That upon failure to maintain the general
9 .	average of eighty-five per cent, students under (b) shall
10	automatically revert to the category of students under (a)
11.	and those under (a) shall automatically revert to the cate-
12	gory of students required to pursue the preparatory course
13	in four years mentioned above.
14	The medical course shall be at least five years, includ-
15	ing not less than eleven rotating internship in an approved
16	hospital, and shall consist of the following subjects:
17	Anatomy
18	Physiology
19	Biochemistry and Nutrition
20	Pharmacology
21	Microbiology
22.	Parasitology
23	Medicine and Therapeutics
24	Genycology '

1	Opthalmology, Otology, Rhinology and Laryngology
2	Pediatrics

5 '	Preventive Medicine and Public Health
6	Legal Medicine, including Medical Jurisprudence
7	and Ethics.
8	SEC. 7. Admission requirements.—The medical college
9	may admit any student to its first year class who has not
10	been convicted by any court of competent jurisdiction of
11	any offense involving moral turpitude, and who presents
12	(a) a certificate showing completion of a standard high
13	school course, (b) a record showing completion of a stand-
14	ard preparatory medical course as herein provided, (c) a
15	certificate of registration as medical student, (d) a certif-
16	icate of good moral character issued by two former pro-
17	fessors in the pre-medicine course, and (e) birth certificate
18	and marriage certificate, if any. Nothing in this Act shall
19	be construed to inhibit any college of medicine from es-
20	tablishing, in addition to the preceding, other entrance
21	requirements that may be deemed admissible.
22	For the purposes of this Act, the term "College of
23	Medicine" shall mean to include faculty of medicine,
24	institute of medicine, school of medicine or other similar

1	institution offering a complete medical course leading to
2	the degree of Doctor of Medicine or its equivalent.
3	Every college of medicine must keep a complete record
4	of enrollment, grades and turnover, and must publish each
5	year a catalogue giving the following information:
6	1. Date of publication
7	2. Calendar for the academic year
8	3. Faculty roll indicating whether on full time part
9	time basis
10	4. Requirements of admission
11	5. Grading system
12	6. Requirements for promotion
13	7. Requirements for graduation
14	8. Medical hours per academic year by departments
15	9. Schedule hours per academic year by departments
16	10. Number of students enrolled in each class.
17	ARTICLE III.—The Board of Medical Examiners;
18	, Registration of Physicians
19	SEC. 8. Pre-requisite to the practice of medicine.—No
20	person shall engage in the practice of medicine in the Phil-
21	ippines unless he has satisfactorily passed the correspond-
22	ing Board Examination and is a holder of a valid Certificate
23	of Registration duly issued to him by the Board of Medical
24	Examiners.

1	SEC. 9. Candidates for board examinations.—Candidate
. 2	for Board examinations shall have the following qualifica
3	tions:
4	(1) He shall be a citizen of the Philippines or a citizen
5	of any foreign country who has submitted com-
6	petent and conclusive documentary evidence
7	confirmed by the Department of Foreign Affairs
8	showing that this country's existing laws permit
9	citizens of the Philippines to practice medicine
10	under the same rules and regulations governing
_11	citizens thereof, provided that there is an equal
12	number of Filipino physicians in actual practice
13	in that particular country.
14	(2) He shall not be less than twenty-one years of
15	age;
16	(3) He shall be of good moral character, showing
17	for this purpose certificate of civil status;
18	(4) He shall be of sound mind;
19	(5) He shall not have been convicted by a court of
20	competent jurisdiction of any offense involving
21	moral turpitude; and
22	(6) He shall be a holder of the degree of Doctor of
23	Medicine or its equivalent, conferred by a col-
24	lege of medicine duly recognized by the Depart-
25	ment of Education.

SEC. 10. Acts constituting practice of medicine.—A person shall be considered as engaged in the practice of 2 medicine (a) who shall, for compensation, fee, salary or 3 4 reward in any form, paid to him directly or through another, or even without the same, physically examine any 5 person, and diagnose, treat, operate or prescribe any re-6 medy for any human disease, injury, deformity, physical, 7 8 mental or physical condition or any ailment, real or ima-9 ginary, regardless of the nature of the remedy or treat-10 ment administered, prescribed or recommended; or (b) who 11 shall, by means of signs, cards, advertisements, written or 12 printed matter, or through the radio, television or any 13 other means of communication, either offer or undertake 14 by any means or method to diagnose, treat, operate or prescribe any remedy for any human disease, injury, de-15 formity, physical, mental or physical condition; or (c) who 16 17 shall use the title M.D. after his name. SEC. 11. Exemptions.—The preceding section shall not 18 be construed to affect (a) any medical student duly en-19 rolled in an approved medical college or school under 20 training, serving without any professional fee in any gov-21 ernment or private hospital, provided that he renders such 22 service under the direct supervision and control of a regis-23 tered physician; (b) any legally registered dentist engaged 24

exclusively in the practice of dentistry; (c) any duly reg-1 istered masseur or physiotherapist, provided that he applies 2 3 massage or other physical means upon written order or prescription of a duly registered physician, or provided 4 that such application of massage or physical means shall 5 6 be limited to physical or muscular development; (d) any 7 duly registered optometrist who mechanically fits or sells lenses, artificial eyes, limbs or other similar appliances or who is engaged in the mechanical examination of eyes for 9 the purpose of constructing or adjusting eye glasses, spec-10 tacles and lenses; (e) any person who renders any service 11 12 gratuitously in cases of emergency, or in places where the 13 services of a duly registered physician, nurse or midwife 14 are not available; (f) any person who administers or rec-15 ommends any household remedy as per classification of 16 existing Pharmacy Laws; and (g) any psychologist or 17 mental hygienist in the performance of his duties, provided 18 such performance is done in conjunction with a duly reg-19 istered physician. 20 SEC. 12. Limited practice without any certificate of registration.—Certificates of registration shall not be required 21 22 of the following persons: 23 (a) Physicians and surgeons from other countries called

in consultation only and exclusively in specific and definite

- 1 cases, or those attached to international bodies or organ-
- 2 izations assigned to perform certain definite work in the
- 3 Philippines, provided they shall limit their practice to the
- 4 specific work assigned to them and provided further they
- 5 shall secure a previous authorization from the Board of
- 6 Medical Examiners.
- 7 (b) Commissioned medical officers of the United States
- 8 Armed Forces stationed in the Philippines while rendering
- 9 service as such only for the members of the said Armed
- 10 Forces and within the limit of their own respective ter-
- 11 ritorial jurisdiction.
- 12 (c) Foreign physicians employed as exchange profes-
- 13 sors in special branches of medicine or surgery whose
- 14 service may, in the discretion of the Board of Medical
- 15 Education, be necessary.
- 16 (d) Medical students who have completed the first four
- 17 years of medical course, graduates of medicine and reg-
- 18 istered nurses who may be given limited and special
- 19 authorization by the Secretary of Health to render medical
- 20 services during epidemics or national emergencies when-
- 21 ever the services of duly registered physicians are not
- 22 available. Such authorization shall automatically cease
- 23 when the epidemic or national emergency is declared ter-
- 24 minated by the Secretary of Health.

1 SEC. 13. The Board of Medical Examiners, its composition and duties .- The Board of Medical Examiners shall 2 be composed of six members to be appointed by the Pres-3 ident of the Philippines from a confidential list of not more 4 5 than twelve names approved and submitted by the executive 6 council of the Philippine Medical Association, after due consultation with other medical associations, during the 7 months of April and October of each year. The Chair-8 9 man of the Board shall be elected from among themselves by the members at a meeting called for the purpose. 10 President of the Philippines shall fill any vacancy that 11 12 may occur during any examination from the list of names submitted by the Philippine Medical Association in accord-13 14 ance with the provisions of this Act. No examiner shall handle the examinations in more than 15 four subjects or groups of subjects as hereinafter provided. 16 The distribution of subjects to each member shall be agreed 17 upon at a meeting called by the Chairman for the pur-18 The examination papers shall be under the custody , 19 pose. of the Commissioner of Civil Service or his duly authorized . 20 representative, and shall be distributed to each member 21 of the Board who shall correct, grade, and sign, and 22 submit them to the said Commissioner within one hundred 23 twenty days from the date of the termination of the 24 25 examinations.

- 1 A final meeting of the Board for the deliberation and
- 2 approval of the grades shall be called by the Commissioner
- 3 of Civil Service immediately after receipt of the records
- 4 from the members of the Board of Medical Examiners.
- 5 The secretary of the Board shall submit to the President
- 6 of the Philippines for approval the names of the successful
- 7 candidates as having been duly qualified for licensure in
- 8 alphabetical order, without stating the ratings obtained
- 9 by each.
- 10 SEC. 14. Qualifications of examiners.—No person shall
- 11 be appointed a member of the Board of Medical Examiners
- 12 unless he (1) is a natural-born citizen of the Philippines,
- 13 (2) is a duly registered physician in the Philippines, (3)
- 14 has been in the practice of medicine for at least ten years,
- 15 (4) is of good moral character and of recognized standing
- 16 in the medical profession, (5) is not a member of the
- 17 faculty of any medical school and has no pecuniary in-
- 18 terest, directly or indirectly, in any college of medicine
- 19 or in any institution where any branch of medicine is
- 20 taught, at the time of his appointment: Provided, That
- 21 of the six members to be appointed, not more than two
- 22 shall be graduates of the same institution and not more
- 23 than three shall be government physicians.
- 24 SEC. 15. Tenure of office and compensation of members.
- 25 The members of the Board of Medical Examiners shall

- 1 hold office for one year: Provided, That any member may
- 2 be reappointed for not more than one year. Each member
- 3 shall receive as compensation ten pesos for each candidate
- 4 examined for registration as physician, and five pesos for
- 5 each candidate examined in the preliminary or final
- 6 physician examination.
- 7 The President of the Philippines, upon the recommenda-
- 8 tion of the Commissioner of Civil Service, after due in-
- 9 vestigation, may remove any member of the Board of
- 10 Medical Examiners for neglect of duty, incompetency, or
- 11 unprofessional or dishonorable conduct.
- 12 SEC. 16. Executive Officer and Secretary of the Board.
- 13 The secretary of the Boards of Examiners appointed in
- 14 accordance with section ten of Act Numbered Four thousand
- 15 seven, as amended, shall also be the secretary of the Board
- 16 of Medical Examiners, who shall keep all the records,
- 17 including examination papers, and the minutes of the
- 18 deliberations of the Board. He shall also keep a register
- 19 of all persons to whom certificates of registration has been
- 20 granted; set forth the name, sex, age, and place of birth
- 21 of each, place of business, post office address, the name of
- 22 the medical college or university from which he graduated
- 23 or in which he had studied, together with time spent in
- 24 the study of the profession elsewhere, the name of the

1 country where the institution is located which had granted 2 to him the degree or certificate of attendance upon clinic 3 and all lectures in medicine and surgery, and all other 4 degrees granted to him from institutions of learning. He 5 shall keep an up-to-date registration book of all duly 6 registered physicians in the Philippines. He shall furnish copies of all examination questions and ratings in each 7 8 subject of the respective candidates in the physicians examination, one month after the release of the list of successful 9 examinees, to the deans of the different colleges of medicine 10 11 exclusively for the information and guidance of the facul-12 ties thereof. This report shall be considered as restricted 13 information. Any school which violates this rule shall 14 be deprived of such privilege. The Secretary of the Board shall likewise keep a record of all registered medical 15 students. He shall keep all the records and proceedings, 16 17 and issue and receive all papers in connection with any 18 and all complaints presented to the Board. SEC. 17. Rules and regulations.—The Board of Medical 19 Examiners, with the approval of the Commissioner of 20 Civil Service, shall promulgate such rules and regulations 21 as may be necessary for the proper conduct of the exam-22inations, correction of examination papers, and registra-23 tion of physicians. The Commissioner shall supervise 24 001630

1	each Board examination and enforce the said rules and
2	regulations. These rules and regulations shall take effect
3	fifteen days after the date of their publication in the
4	Official Gazette and shall not be changed within sixty days
5	immediately before any examination. Such rules and reg-
6	ulations shall be printed and distributed for the informa-
7	tion and guidance of all concerned.
8	SEC. 18. Dates of examinations The Board of Medical
9	Examiners shall give examinations for the registration of
10	physicians, one in May and one in November every year,
11	in the City of Manila or any of its suburbs after giving
12	not less than ten days' notice to each candidate who had
13	filed his name and address with the Secretary of the Board.
14	SEC. 19. Fees.—The secretary of the Board, under the
15	supervision of the Commissioner of Civil Service, shall
16	collect from each candidate the following fees:
17	For registration as medical student P5.00
18	For complete physician examination 75.00
19	For preliminary or final examination 40.00
20	For registration as physician 20.00
21	All fees paid as provided herein shall accrue to the
22	funds of the Board of Medical Examiners and be expended
23	for the payment of the compensation of the members
24	thereof. No fees other than those provided herein shall
25	be paid to the Board.

Sec. 20. Issuance of Certificate of Registration, grounds 1 for refusal of same.—The Commissioner of Civil Service 2 and the secretary of the Board of Medical Examiners shall 3 sign jointly and issue certificates of registration to those 4 who have satisfactorily complied with the requirements of 5 They shall not issue a certificate of registration 6 the Board. to any candidate who has been convicted by a court of 7 competent jurisdiction of any criminal offense involving 8 moral turpitude, or has been found guilty of immoral or 9 dishonorable conduct after due investigation by the Board 10 of Medical Examiners, or has been declared to be of un-11 sound mind. 12 SEC. 21. Scope of examination.—The examination for 13 the registration of physicians shall consist of the following 14 subjects: (1) Anatomy and Histology, (2) Physiology, (3) 15 Biochemistry, (4) Microbiology and Parasitology, 16 Pharmacology and Therapeutics, (6) Pathology, (7) Medi-17 cine, (8) Obstetrics and Gynecology, (9) Pediatrics and 18 Nutrition, (10) Surgery and Opthalmology, Otolaryngology 19 and Rhinology, (11) Preventive Medicine and Public 20 Health, and (12) Legal Medicine, Ethics and Medical 21 Jurisprudence: Provided, however, That the examination 22 questions in each subject or group of subjects shall at least 23 be ten in number: Provided, further, That the examination 24 questions in Medicine shall include at least three from the 25 001680

- 1 following branches: Infectious diseases, Neurology, Derma-
- 2 tology, Allergy, Endocrinology and Cardio-Vascular dis-
- 3 'eases: Provided, finally, That the examination questions
- 4 in Surgery shall include at least four questions from the
- 5 following: Opthalmology, Otology, Rhinology, Laryngology,
- 6 Orthopedic Surgery and Anesthesiology.
- 7 The questions shall be the same for all applicants. All
- 8 answers must be written either in English or Spanish.
- 9 No name of the examinee shall appear in the examination
- 10 paper but the examiners shall devise a system whereby
- 11 each applicant can be identified by number only.
- 12 In order that a candidate may be deemed to have passed
- 13 his examination successfully he must have obtained a
- 14 general average of seventy-five per cent without a grade
- 15 lower than sixty-five per cent in Medicine, Pediatrics and
- 16 Nutrition, Obstetrics and Gynecology, and Preventive Medi-
- 17 cine and Public Health, and no grade lower than fifty per
- 18 cent in the rest of the subjects.
- 19 The preliminary examinations shall comprise of the
- 20 following subjects:
- 21 (1) Gross Anatomy and Histology
- 22 (2) Physiology
- ·23 (3) Biochemistry
- 24 (4) Microbiology and Parasitology

SEC. 22. Administrative investigations.—In addition to 1 the functions provided for in the preceding sections, the 2 Board of Medical Examiners shall perform the following 3 duties: (1) to administer oath to physicians who qualified 4 in the examination; (2) to study the conditions affecting 5 6 the practice of medicine in all parts of the Philippines; (3) to exercise the powers conferred upon it by this article 7 8 with the view of maintaining the ethical and professional standards of the medical profession; (4) to subpoena or 9 subpoena duces tecum, witnesses for all purposes required 10 in the discharge of its duties; and (5) to promulgate, with 11 the approval of the Commissioner of Civil Service, such 12 rules and regulations as it may deem necessary for the 13 performance of its duties in harmony with the provisions 14 of this Act and necessary for the proper practice of 15 16 medicine in the Philippines. 17 Administrative investigations may be conducted by not 18 less than four members of the Board of Medical Exam-19 iners; otherwise the proceedings shall be considered void. 20 The existing rules of evidence shall be observed during 21 all administrative investigations. The Board may disapprove applications for examination or registration, 22 reprimand erring physicians, or suspend or revoke reg-23 001680

- 1 istration certificates, if the respondents are found guilty
- 2 after due investigations.
- 3 SEC. 23. Procedure and rules.—Within five days after
- 4 the filing of written charges under oath, the respondent
- 5 physician shall be furnished a copy thereof, without re-
- 6 quiring him or her to answer the same, and the Board
- 7 shall conduct the investigation within five days after the
- 8 receipt of such copy by the respondent. The investigation
- 9 shall be completed as soon as practicable.
- 10 SEC. 24. Grounds for reprimand, suspension or revoca-
- 11 tion of registration certificate.—Any of the following
- 12 shall be sufficient ground for reprimanding a physician,
- 13 or for suspending or revoking a certificate of registration
- 14 as physician:
- 15 (1) Conviction by a court of competent jurisdiction of
- 16 any criminal offense involving moral turpitude;
- 17 (2) Immoral or dishonorable conduct;
- 18 (3) Insanity;
- 19 (4) Fraud in the acquisition of the certificate of regis-
- 20 tration;
- 21 (5) Gross negligence, ignorance or incompetence in the
- 22 practice of his or her profession resulting in an injury
- 23 to or death of the patient;

- 1 (6) Addiction to alcoholic beverages or to any habit-
- 2 forming drug rendering him or her incompetent to practice
- 3 his or her profession;
- 4 (7) False or extravagant or unethical advertisements
- 5 wherein other things than his name, profession, limitation
- 6 of practice, clinic hours, office and home address, are men-
- 7 tioned. Advertising by the respondent for the purpose
- 8 of enhancing his prestige and increasing his clientele, of
- 9 postgraduate studies or the possession of special certifi-
- 10 cates or degrees from colleges or clinics where post-
- 11 graduate work was pursued, or of previous service or
- 12 experience in any institution, governmental or otherwise;
- 13 mention of allegedly unusual or special technique in treat-
- 14 ment; publication of duly identified photographs showing
- 15 the respondent in action; and the enumeration of different
- 16 diseases or modes of treatment thereof or guaranteeing
- 17 or warranting operations or cure of any disease, shall be
- 18 considered as unethical advertisements.
- 19 (8) Performance of or aiding in any criminal abortion;
- 20 (9) Knowingly issuing any false medical certificate;
- 21 (10) Issuing any statement or spreading any news or
- 22 rumor which is derogatory to the character and reputation
- 23 of another physician without justifiable motive;

- 1 (11) Aiding or acting as a dummy of an unqualified or
- 2 unregistered person to practise medicine;
- 3 (12) Violation of any provision of the Code of Ethics as
- 4 approved by the Philippine Medical Association.
- 5 Refusal of a physician to attend a patient in danger
- 6 of death is not a sufficient ground for revocation or sus-
- 7 pension of his registration certificate if there is a risk
- 8 to the physician's life.
- 9 SEC. 25. Rights of respondents.—The respondent physi-
- 10 cian shall be entitled to be represented by counsel or be
- 11 heard by himself or herself, to have a speedy and public
- 12 hearing, to confront and to cross-examine witnesses
- 13 against him or her, and to all other rights guaranteed by
- 14 the Constitution and provided for in the Rules of Court.
- 15 SEC. 26. Appeal from judgment.—The decision of the
- 16 Board of Medical Examiners shall automatically become
- 17 final thirty days after the date of its promulgation unless
- 18 the respondent, during the same period, has appealed to
- 19 the Commissioner of Civil Service and later to the Office
- 20 of the President of the Philippines. If the final decision
- 21 is not satisfactory, the respondent may ask for a review of
- 22 the case, or may file in court a petition for certiorari.
- 23 SEC. 27. Reinstatement.—After five years, the Board
- 24 may order the reinstatement of any physician whose cer-

- 1 tificate of registration has been revoked, if the respondent
- 2 has acted in an exemplary manner in the community
- 3 wherein he resides and has not committed any illegal, im-
- 4 moral or dishonorable act.
- 5 ARTICLE IV.—Penal and Other Provisions
- 6 SEC. 28. Penalties.—Any person found guilty of "illegal
- 7 practice of medicine" shall be punished by a fine of not
- 8 less than one thousand pesos nor more than ten thousand
- 9 pesos with subsidiary imprisonment in case of insolvency,
- 10 or by imprisonment or not less than one year nor more
- 11 than five years, or by both such fine and imprisonment,
- 12 in the discretion of the court.
- 13 SEC. 29. Injunctions.—The Board of Medical Examiners
- 14 may file an action to enjoin any person illegally practicing
- 15 medicine from the performance of any act constituting
- 16 practice of medicine if the case so warrants until the
- 17 necessary certificate therefor is secured. Any such per-
- 18 son who, after having been so enjoined, continues in the
- 19 illegal practice of medicine shall be punished for contempt
- 20 of court. The said injunction shall not relieve the person
- 21 practicing medicine without certificate of registration
- 22 from criminal prosecution and punishment as provided
- 23 in the preceding section.

- 1 SEC. 30. Appropriation.—To carry out the provisions of
- 2 this Act, there is hereby appropriated, out of any funds
- 3 in the National Treasury not otherwise appropriated, the
- 4 sum of twenty thousand pesos.
- 5 SEC. 31. Repealing clause.—All Acts, executive orders,
- 6 administrative orders, rules and regulations, or parts
- 7 thereof inconsistent with the provisions of this Act are
- 8 repealed or modified accordingly.
- 9 SEC. 32. Effectivity.—This Act shall take effect upon its
- 10 approval: Provided, That if it is approved during the time
- 11 when examinations for physicians are held, it shall take
- 12 effect immediately after the said examinations: Provided,
- 13 further, That section six of this Act shall take effect at
- 14 the beginning of the academic year nineteen hundred sixty
- 15 to nineteen hundred sixty-one, and the first paragraph of
- 16 section seven shall take effect four years thereafter.
