crime either in itself. What is prohibited is "knowing membership"; that is, overt act of membership in the Communist Party of the Philippines. That means that any person who, after the enactment, or after the approval of the said law, shall knowingly become a member of the Communist Party in the Philippines, together with its military arm, that had been declared by the Anti-Subversion Law as an organized conspiracy against the Government of the Republic of the Philippines that seeks to overthrow it by means of force and violence and to deliver the country to foreign control or domination. That is really the definition of a subversive organization. If one who joins it, or becomes a member of the Communist Party without such foreknowledge but thereafter acquires that knowledge still remains as a member of the Communist Party of the Philippines, that becomes now "Knowing membership" which is punishable under the Anti-Subversion Law. I just want to complete our record by volunteering that information for whatever it may be worth. I hope it does not tarnish by one whit the Gentleman's speech which, by itself, is already a gem that deserves the praise and acknowledgment of the members of this Body and of the general public.

Thank you, Mr. President.

Senator Pimentel. If my speech is a gem, the Gentleman's remarks are a jewel fit to crown the whole proceedings tonight.

Senator Mercado. Mr. President.

Senator Mercado. Can I just ask one question? I have just been wondering in all of these labellings of leftist and rightist. Did it ever occur to the Gentleman where the center was? Because I am reminded, Mr. President, of organizations in the United States, just like, let us say, the John Bird Society which can freely call, I

believe, if I remember right, even the fact that when you are labelled leftist or rightist depends on the one who is looking at you and his political spectrum for that matter.

Senator Pimentel. That is why Lipset insists that these terms are very imprecise and there is no categorical delineation of the meaning of these terms actually.

Senator Mercado. Thank you very much, and we appreciate the fact that being labelled leftist or rightist can be a very dangerous thing nowadays.
