SENATE

Senator ZULUETA. This is only a question of clarification. Last year, the first time this bill was called for discussion in the Senate I happened to talk to Senator López and he told me he was agreeable and now he changes his mind.

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Senator López. Last year when the distinguished gentleman from Iloílo talked to me regarding this bill, I answered him that I would have no objection because at that time our finances were still sound. Now, there is not enough money, and besides, only fools don't change their mind.

The PRESIDENT. The gentleman from Iloilo may proceed with his speech.

Senator López. Thank you, Mr. President. To show that this is class legislation, I want to read Section 3 of this bill, as follows:

"Sec. 3. When the Auditor General takes advantage of the provisions of this Act, he shall not be entitled to retire under Republic Act Numbered Six hundred and sixty, as amended, nor under any other retirement Act, but shall be entitled to the refund of his personal share in the retirement premiums paid to the Government Service Insurance System with the usual interest granted by the System."

Mr. President, this is a class legislation. This would give pension only to the Auditor General. We know many employees of the Government who will retire and they are not given this benefit. I am sure that my colleagues in the Senate will not a friend, that is, Auditor General Agregado. I know he has been lobbying for two or three days that this bill will be approved. So I think, Mr. President, that we should postpone the consideration Finance for further study.

Senator Púyar. Mr. President, I have taken a good note of the remarks of the distinguished gentleman for the remarks tleman from Iloílo and precisely as I mention in my sponson Iloílo and precisely as I series of my sponsorship, that I am preparing a series of amendment has been a sponsorship. amendments so that this bill will not be classified as a hill as a bill purporting to benefit an individual or a few individual individuals. The amendments will cover constitutional office. tional officials so that the purpose is, if the intention of the Country of the C of the Constitution is to give these officials certain independent independence in their duties and act without fear or favor their duties are act without fear or favor while they hold office thereby insuring their independent they hold office thereby insuring their independence should they continue, so as not to place these office should they continue, as as not to place these officials in an embarrassing position after they shall in an embarrassing these amendthey shall have left their position. These amendments will have left their position. ments will take care of these officials for a limited time after time after they shall have ceased to hold their

positions, so that there is no doubt as to the intention of these amendments and to satisfy the gentleman from Iloilo, I will have these amendments mimeographed and distributed among the members of the Senate.

For this reason, I have no objection to postponing the discussion of this bill until tomorrow. What will the gentleman from Iloílo suggest, that we take it up next Monday? (After a pause.) The gentleman from Iloílo requests that it be set on Wednesday of next week, and I accede to his request.
