Senator Guingona. May we know the difference between a parliamentary question of privilege and a privilege speech.

Senator Drilon. Mr. President, under our Rules, a question of personal privilege would pertain to any question affecting the individual or collective privilege of a senator or of the Chamber, while a privilege speech is availed of during the privilege hour on any subject of public interest.

Senator Guingona. Yes, Mr. President. I would like to thank the distinguished Majority Leader for that answer. This is not in any way to block or preempt. It is just for clarification. If I understand correctly, the distinguished gentleman's privilege speech is based on a pending Senate investigation.

Senator Drilon. We are not aware of that, Mr. President. As a matter of procedure, Senator Enrile may wish to state, for the record, the point of personal privilege.

Senator Enrile. Actually, I was going to start that but I was interrupted. I would like to thank the Chair for that permission.
